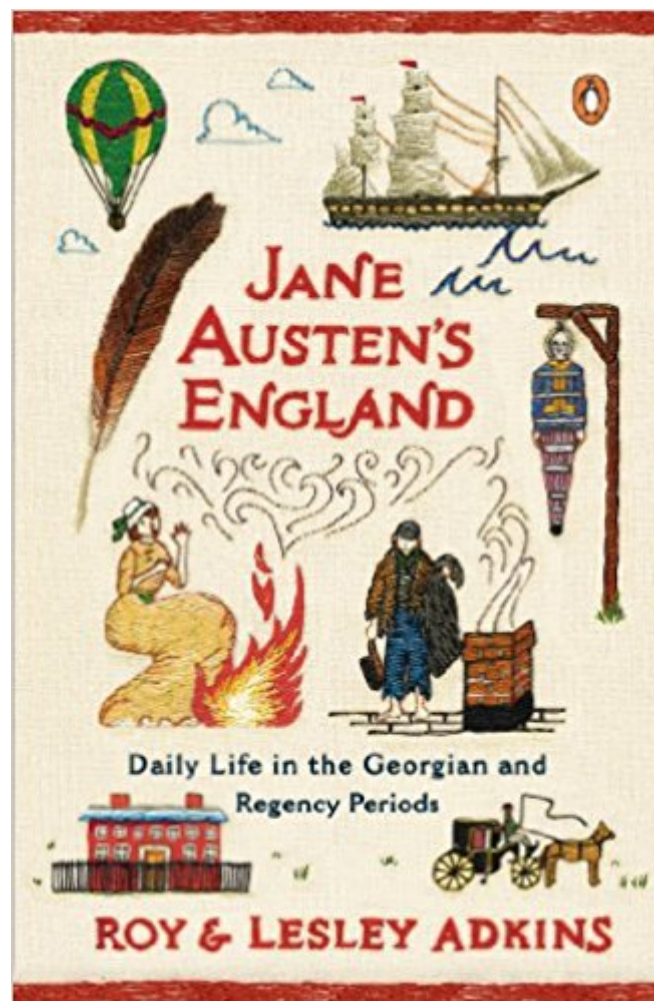




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Jane Austen's England: Daily Life In The Georgian And Regency Periods

I bought this book for my wife, who is a big Jane Austen fan. The book is not a novel; it has chapters about various aspects of life in England during the years of Jane Austen's life. I started reading the book myself and was captivated and surprised and much of the information--I read the entire book. The book is well written and has references to key sources to document the accuracy of the information. The book has chapters on living conditions, food, travel, health and medicine, crime, marriage, and many other topics. I learned that the characters in Jane Austen's books were wealthy and privileged, and thus they did not experience many of the challenges and hardships that most people experienced in England at that time. The book had many interesting and unexpected facts, such as: (1) people were put in jail for even minor crimes or even shipped out of the country, (2) grave robbers got body parts, such as real teeth from the dead that were then used as false teeth later for other people, (3) people did not want to travel much due to unmarked roads and robbers, and (4) even when they traveled, they did not want to stay at inns because of bed bugs (they sometimes sleep in the chairs instead of the beds because of this). Very interesting book. It helps you appreciate how some standardization of procedures and products today help us out so much.

This compelling, fascinating, and detailed book gives both Jane Austen fans and history buffs a look at what life was like outside tea rooms at Bath and dances in country manors. There are plentiful quotes from letters, diaries, and newspapers of that time to make personal the careful professional research that must have gone into writing the book. The "Some violence" rating box is checked only because the authors honestly describe the harsh living conditions of England's 18th century poor, including severe penalties for what we would think as merely a misdemeanor today and the heart-breaking, wide spread use of child labor. These facts give a firm foundation to the flights of fancy in Jane Austen's novels.

This book is a great little history snapshot of Regency England. It answers lots of questions about the customs and lifestyle of this short and unique time in English history, and really helps to explain some quirky things in Jane Austen's novels. It can be read cover to cover, or flipped through repeatedly as a reference. I highly recommend this to any Jane Austen fan.

This is a great overview of times during Austen's life. The authors tie bits of Austen's life, letters, and books into the history of England during her life. It is not a biography of her life or a critique of her work, but of the England that she lived in. The chapters are divided into various aspects of life, which made it a fun read to me. The authors cover birth, marriage, crime, travel, medicine, etc. Interesting things like Luddites, grave robbing to supply training doctors with corpses, poor laws trapping people in their places of birth, etc, are all covered.

Observers of Jane Austen often remark about her omissions: she did not write about the political events of the period nor did she include much information about the lower classes. Instead of producing a broad picture of England at the time, her comment describing her work as "the little bit (two inches wide) of ivory on which I work with so fine a brush" indicates that these omissions were by choice. In Jane Austen's England, Roy Adkins provides this missing information. Most of his details tell of the difficult life of the lower classes. He organized the information into 12 chapters and carefully documented it with endnotes and a bibliography. This book is an excellent choice for a reader who wishes to know more about Jane Austen's world. On the other hand, I did not find that it was particularly helpful for a better understanding of Jane Austen as much of the information is not relevant to the focus of her stories of genteel young ladies overcoming impediments to finding a suitable husband. If Jane Austen had included more information about England, it would have ruined her stories. But this book does complement her work by describing the manners and customs of Englishmen who were not her characters.

This easy to read account of life in the time of Jane Austen's life is fascinating. The book covers so many facets of life and illustrates a very different experience than what Jane Austen portrayed in her

stories.

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
