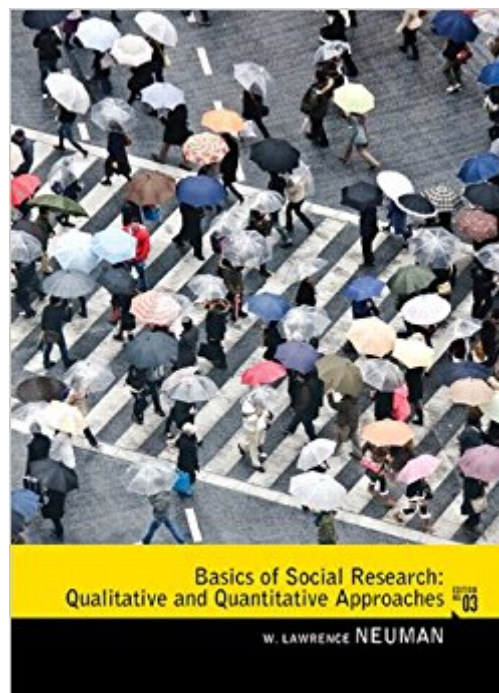




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Basics Of Social Research: Qualitative And Quantitative Approaches (3rd Edition)

I would rather gouge my eyes out than read another page of this book. His writing style is so convoluted, I feel like you could learn more by reading a summary of each chapter. Many of his definitions for terms are just the terms itself. Many of his examples (there is an example in almost every paragraph as well as large example boxes on a majority of pages) are long winded and detract from the flow of the terminology and concepts presented. For every one important idea he presents, there are 9 ideas of benign minutiae. If you're in a class where the teacher is using this book. Drop the class or pick a different teacher because if they find this useful in the teaching of sociology, their teaching skills are questionable in my opinion.

The author spends too much time defining terms that I learned in 3rd grade and had drilled into my head ever since. I (and I would expect other college and graduate students) do not need to have "hypothesis" and "theory" defined for me once again with long explanations as to what these terms mean. Maybe I am not the best person to review it. I am on my second masters degree (this is for my graduate level research methods class) and I have had two research methods classes already (one in undergrad and one in my last grad program). Despite that, I think that it would be amateurish and not much help for any college or graduate student, but especially graduate students. Maybe if someone was in a lower level research methods class it would be of help. If I later decide I am wrong, and find something helpful in here, I will update this review.

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
