

It's no wonder that he was on the run for most of his university years: from Montana to Scotland, on to France, back to Canada, and then to England. This wayward youth didn't help him much in the job market: Over the years he has worked in jobs as varied as bookstore manager, catering chef, tile setter, remodeler, bartender, and bovine artificial inseminator. Nearly all these jobs have subsidized him at one time or another while he struggled to establish himself as a writer. Bill's first travel guide was Moon Handbooks: Montana, and of all his

books it remains his favorite. He is the co-author of Moon Handbooks: Utah and has written other travel guides.
