As anyone who has ever entertained the notion of spending a year or two teaching English overseas will know, it can be incredibly difficult to find a source of useful, objective and unbiased information. It seems almost a prerequisite for teachers to keep a blog of their experiences, but all too often their - albeit funny and entertaining - posts only skim the surface of the realities of life as an English teacher. They'll tell you about their favourite Thai dishes, where to find the best bowl of Pho in Hanoi or the best bar in Phnom Penh, but when it comes to questions like 'how will I find work?', 'do I need to speak the language of my host country?' or, most importantly, 'what qualifications do I need to find a job?' they're often frustratingly silent. This book presents all that information and more. It doesn't just rave on about the food and weather, but tells you exactly what you need to know to make your dream a reality. It gives you solid guidance drawn from those who've gone before to help you find a great job, avoid the pitfalls and make the most of your time in South East Asia. I've never personally taught English (though I've lived in Bangkok for several years and travelled extensively in the region), but based on how closely the content of this book matches the experiences of my teacher friends I'd have no hesitation in recommending this guide to anyone interested in exploring the possibility.

Great little book with a wealth of experience that clearly reflects the author's multi-year stay in SE Asia. Anyone curious as to what the realities of what TEFL in SE Asia looks like should read this, it is an excellent primer and has many practical resources as well (information about teaching programs, places to teach, average costs & earnings, etc.). Even more, once I decided I wanted to join a friend of mine in Thailand (not covered in this book) and wrote the author a few questions given he'd lived in Thailand, he wrote me back quickly with a ton of great information, and even suggested we get a beer in Bangkok and talk it over in person. I'm going to take him up on that offer, and if you're at all curious about teaching English in SE Asia, you should pick up this book.

I was really impressed with this book. The book is concise without being short. The content is good and placed in the logical location. Particularly, I liked the comparisons between the countries. The school and certificate references also make it worth a re-read or keeping the book on your virtual shelf. Free sources have some of this information, but nowhere are they organized like this. The book's author has a lot of years of experience teaching in and around these countries so that was also a plus. If you are thinking about teaching here, you should definitely pick up the ebook.
