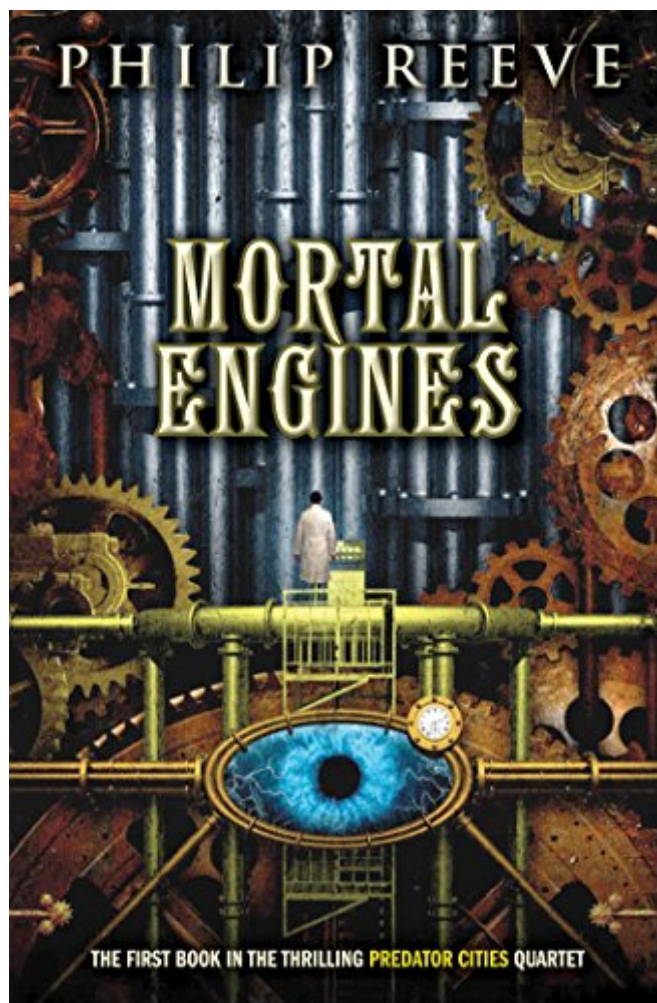

Good story. To be fair, I am much older than the audience the book was written for. I read books like this because they are an escape and the idea of dystopian societies interests me..... not sure why because I wouldn't want this to happen in reality! So -- just wanted to preface my remarks with this disclaimer. I am always looking for exceptional writers in science-fiction/dystopian genre types of literature. Even though Tolkien and C.S. Lewis' works are fantasy, I judge everything I read with the

bar set at the level of these authors' work. This book is not at that level ... and I don't think it was meant to be. The main character just didn't react to all the crisis situations in a way that would or could be expected. He is a little like the main character in Divergent series..... just odd reactions that seem to come from nowhere in particular. But, I've never thought of mobile cities -- interesting concept. Nice to see Darwin's theory tested in this way -- that what or who may be the "fittest" doesn't actually survive over the preservation of life in general. Read the book -- see what you think about it!

This was an interesting, unique concept and it was a fun story. I don't really care about reading the rest of the series, but I felt it was wrapped up in a way that I can be satisfied with the ending from the first book. It's written for a younger audience, but still enjoyable for older.
